We encourage and support all learners to climb; climb to the stars! During their time here at the school, all children will succeed in reaching their full potential.

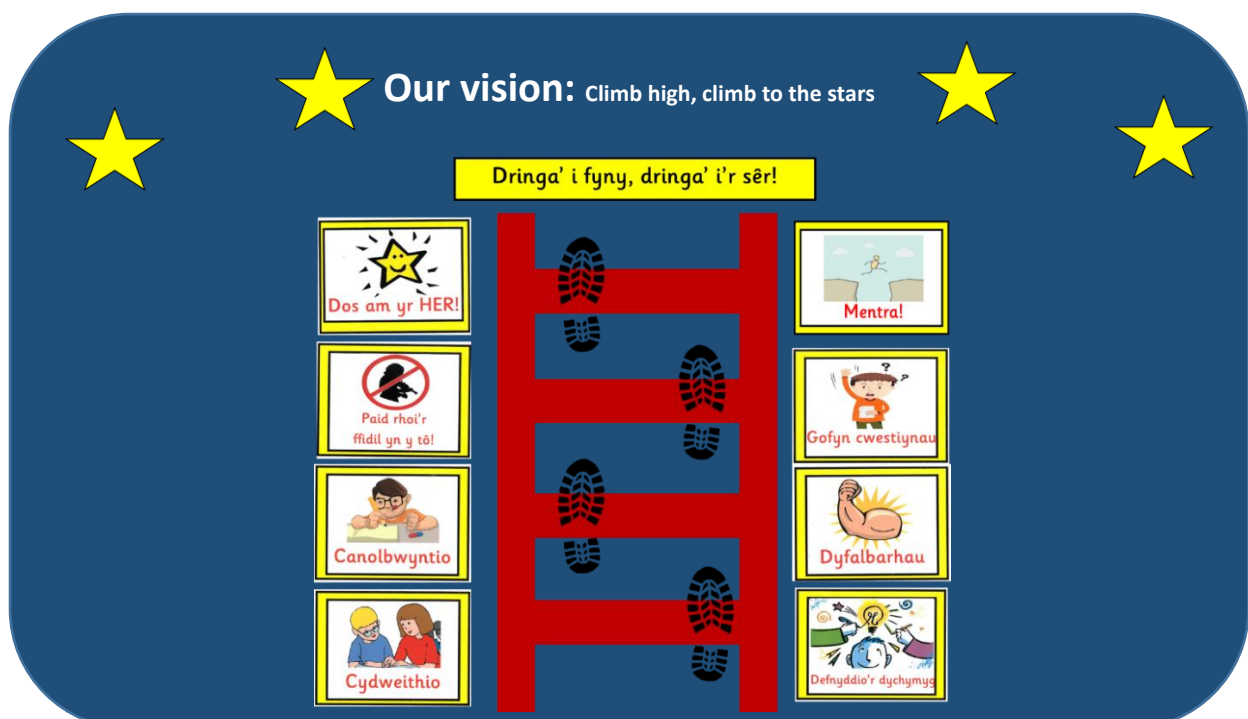

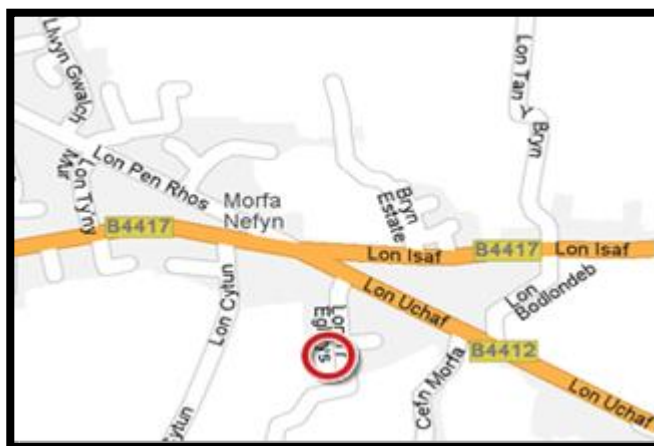


Ysgol Morfa Nefyn's Values

Happiness and enjoyment	Happiness is very important to us here at Ysgol Morfa and we ensure that all children and staff are happy when they come to school. The ethos of each class and the learning experiences are carefully planned to inspire our learners. We ensure that learners are part of the learning and have a voice in every aspect of the school so that they feel ownership, enjoy experiences and develop motivation when learning.

Admissions

When will my child be able to start in the Nursery Class and in full-time education?

Nursery Class

The Authority offers part-time education (10 hours per week) in the month of September following their third birthday, for a whole school year.

At Ysgol Morfa, 5 sessions are held in the morning between 9:00 and 11:00.

It is expected that your child can use the toilet before starting school, unless your child has a medical condition or additional learning needs.

Full time education

Children are admitted to the school full time following their fourth birthday.

You should register your child here: [Reception Class Admission \(llyw.cymru\)](#)

Priority is given to children who live within the catchment area of Ysgol Morfa. The local authority is responsible for considering requests from outside the catchment area.

School transfer

When the children are 8 years old at the end of Year 3, they will transfer to Year 4 at Ysgol Nefyn. You will receive an Information Handbook from Ysgol Nefyn during the year and there will be a strong link between the two schools to ensure a confident transition. There will be an opportunity for the children to visit the school and spend a day there.

Taking your child to school

You may drop off your child at the main school entrance, where a member of staff will be present to supervise the children from 8:35am. Children will be released to parents at classroom doors at 3:00pm.

You will be given an opportunity in September to submit a list of adults who will collect your child from school. Children will only be released to adults noted on the list. We ask you to provide a letter or phone the school if any transport / collection arrangements for your child differ to the usual arrangements.

Language Policy



Every school within the LEA must adhere to Gwynedd Council's language policy. Ysgol Morfa Nefyn is a Welsh medium school and in category 3 of the Welsh Government as they categorize schools according to the language provision. This means that Welsh is the main language for internal communication in the school. We communicate with parents and carers either in Welsh, in English or bilingually as required.

This is a school with a strong Welsh ethos, supporting and enabling the learners to use the Welsh language in all social contexts in and outside the school. As a language immersion setting, all learners are taught fully in Welsh, with English being used at times to ensure understanding during the early immersion period.

From the age of 7 onwards, at least 80% of the learner's school activities (both curricular and extra-curricular) will be in Welsh. The foundations laid will be built on, by continuing to develop pupils' grasp of the Welsh language, and starting the process of developing their skills in English. Year 2 learners will be formally introduced to English in the final term.

In year 3, the school will continue to develop pupils' grasp of the Welsh language paying attention to developing their skills in both languages.

If a child from a non-Welsh speaking home arrives at the school in Year 3 they will have the opportunity to attend the language unit in Llangybi for a term in order to learn the language.

The Welsh language Charter

Ysgol Morfa Nefyn implements the principles of the Gwynedd Language Charter which promotes the natural use of Welsh in all the life and work of the school. You can get more information and have a look at the Strategy here [Strategy laith - Hwb \(gov.wales\)](https://gov.wales/strategy-laith)



This is the Criw Cymraeg. Their role is to promote the use of the Welsh language in the school. The Criw Cymraeg leads and drives the Language Charter at Ysgol Morfa.

The community

The school has a very close contact with the community. Concerts will be held at the Golf Club, St Mary's Church or the Ganolfan (village Centre). We provide opportunities for children to learn in their own environment, taking advantage of nature locations, local galleries and businesses to reinforce the learning. We also visit Plas Madryn on a regular basis to sing for the residents.

We aim to prepare pupils for life as adults in their community by nurturing a spirit of co-operation and respect towards each other and the people around them.



School clubs

Pre-school Care Club and Breakfast Club

We hold a 'Pre-school care club and breakfast club' every morning. The pre-school care club is between 8:00 – 8:20am (fee of £1 per session) and the free breakfast club is between 8:20 – 8:35am. Sessions at the care club or breakfast club need to be booked on the on-line 'school Gateway' payment system. Additional information on how to use the payment system will be shared with parents in advance.

Extra-curricular clubs

Other various clubs will be held occasionally by school teachers throughout the year, e.g. cookery club, fitness club, gardening club, computer club etc.



Charging a fee for activities

We wish to arrange interesting activities that will offer a variety of experiences for the children. At times, we will ask parents for a contribution towards a particular trip or visit.

We request a contribution of £3 per pupil to pay for a bus to take the children swimming to the Leisure Centre once a week. We will strive to keep costs reasonable.

On-line payments

We ask for all payments to be made on the school's on-line payment system on Mondays.

Lunch	All primary school children now receive free school lunches.
Fruit	We encourage the children to eat fruit for a cost of £1.00 per week. The children get to choose a fruit from the fruit shop during the morning break-time. Year 3 children are responsible for the fruit shop, and for ordering and sharing the fruits.
Milk	All primary school children now receive free milk at school.
Swimming	The school organises ten swimming and physical education lessons each term for pupils at the Leisure Centre in Pwllheli. The school pays for these sessions but a contribution of £30 per term is requested to pay for a bus to take the children to the Centre.
Water bottles	We encourage the children to drink water on a regular basis. Every child will receive a reusable water bottle when they start in the Reception class. It is possible to buy additional bottles for £1. The bottle should be brought to school EVERY DAY and taken home to be washed.

School Uniform

It is school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school or when participating in a school organised event outside normal school hours.

The policy for school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school;
- engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school;
- is practical and smart;
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- is regarded as suitable wear for school and is considered by parents/carers as good value for money.

The school uniform policy is an integral part of the school's commitment to equality and inclusion. The governing body believes the school uniform policy allows all pupils to establish a shared identity and celebrate what they have in common, whilst respecting diversity. We wish to see the learners with the school logo on their jumper and polo shirt but this is not compulsory.

The school will organize opportunities for parents to buy second-hand school clothes (which have the school logo on them) annually at the Summer Fair. The school will also have some school uniform items available during the year. Parents are welcome to contact the Headteacher to see the choice available.

We encourage parents to bring any item they no longer need to school so that we can reuse them.

If in doubt, please check with the school office before purchasing items for wear in school.

Reception year pupils to year 3 will have Physical Education lessons on a weekly basis. A physical education uniform and bag with a logo is available to buy via a link on the school website but this uniform is not compulsory.

Communication between the Home and School

This school believes that a happy and open partnership between the home and school is all-important. We very much appreciate the support and co-operation of parents. Parents are invited to take an active interest in the education of their children and to nurture a healthy link between the school and home.

Home and school agreement

The school has a Home and School agreement to ensure that pupils, parents and teachers are aware of their responsibilities. The agreement is shared and signed when the child starts at the school.

Parents meetings

Parents are invited to the school three times during the academic year. In the Autumn term and the Summer term, appointments are arranged for parents to meet the teachers to discuss the attainment and targets of their child. At the parents meetings, teachers will share and discuss the results of any standardised tests undertaken.

Parents are also invited to an open morning or afternoon during the year where they will be given an opportunity to observe their child in the classroom environment and see their work.

Reading and homework

We believe that it is essential for the children to have opportunities to learn at home on a regular basis with their parents. The class teacher will choose a book for children in Year 0 and Year 1 twice a week and children in Years 2 and 3 will choose a suitable book under the supervision of the teacher and read it regularly at home every night.

The parents' co-operation will be sought and it is hoped that they will take an interest in the books and read them with the children. If your child is in Reception year or Year 1, you as parents are asked to record simple comments about your child's reading. Children of Year 2 and 3 are asked to record this for themselves. Sometimes, the teachers may ask a child to undertake additional work at home, e.g. to learn to spell or learn multiplication tables.

Blended learning

The teachers will set collective learning tasks at times which are tasks to be done at home with parents which will reinforce what has been done at school. These tasks are set digitally and are an effective way for parents to be aware of their child's attainment, targets and success. The school makes use of the app seesaw, purplemash and google classroom for the combined learning tasks. Detailed guidelines will be shared with parents at the start of the year. It is hoped that the home will cooperate fully and encourage the child to carry out the work to the best of their ability.

The app seesaw is used in the same way to share pictures of the class activities with parents on a regular basis, in order to ensure effective contact between home and school.

Parents' Association

The school has a prosperous Parents' Association that organises a number of activities during the year in order to contribute towards the costs of trips, buses and school resources. Diverse evenings such as the Summer/Christmas Fair, sponsored walks, Auction of Promises, Bingo and social evenings are organised. Raising money through various activities enhances resources and enriches the experiences provided to the pupils.

Meetings

The Parents' Association will meet every term to discuss educational, cultural or social matters and all parents are welcomed to attend to support or share any new ideas. The first meeting will be held early in the Autumn term as this meeting is an opportunity for new parents to get to know the school and to socialise together.

We are extremely grateful of the efforts of our parents' association and we appreciate the support of all parents when organising the various activities to raise money.

School Council

Here is the School Council for 2025-26:



The School Council exists to ensure that the pupils are able to officially voice their concerns or ideas. The Council consists of the eldest children in the school who are in year 3. The school councillors meet once a term to discuss issues that are important to themselves and their peers. Their opinion is very important and they are included in the school's self-evaluation processes by scrutinising books and responding to questionnaires on a regular basis.

Improvements carried out in the past following the intervention of the School Council include the introduction of a fruit shop, cycle stands, a climbing frame and a request for various clubs e.g. cookery class. In addition, they will organise activities every term which includes a walking to school week, fundraising activities for various charities and promoting the actions of the Welsh language charter.

Attendance

Every day counts!

The school has a duty to ensure that the pupils attend regularly. If a child is not present for a session, he/she will be marked as absent. Parents are expected to contact the school as soon as possible so as to account for the absence. We place great emphasis on obtaining an explanation for every absence. We encourage parents to make medical/dental appointments outside school hours.

In accordance with National Assembly regulations, all schools must classify absences by one of two methods: authorised or unauthorised.

Authorised Absence	an absence authorised by the parents and school, e.g. a child has been ill, the parents have sent an explanatory letter to school.
Unauthorised Absence	an absence where the school has not received a satisfactory explanation.

Up to ten days of holidays can be requested during one academic year. The Headteacher considers these requests individually. We strongly urge parents not to take their children out of school during the academic year so as to ensure effective learning.

Information on school attendance is retained electronically by the LEA. Education Welfare Officers are asked to visit the homes of any parents whose children's attendance figures are of concern to the school and LEA.

Ethos and Behaviour

At Ysgol Morfa, we believe that a high standard of behaviour and a positive ethos are essential for quality learning. The school promotes a high standard of behaviour by following the strategies of the Webster-Stratton scheme, which focuses on praising good behaviour and regularly reminding children of the school's rules.

Our classrooms are busy and attractive places. The children enjoy learning, work hard and behave well. We believe in protecting the rights of all pupils to learning and safety and as a result we follow clear steps if a child does not adhere to the rules or if they behave disruptively. A copy of the full behaviour policy is available at the school.

I would like to emphasise that we are very proud of the outstanding behaviour of the pupils and we are very proud of how the school has developed a close atmosphere where everyone respects each other.

Accidents and Medications

We will care for and comfort any child who becomes ill at school or who suffers an accident. If the class teachers and first aiders consider it necessary, we will contact you and ask you to collect your child. For this reason, it is essential that the school is kept informed of any changes to your contact details.

Records of accidents are kept on file, and an accident slip is sent home to explain what has happened. In an emergency where a parent cannot be contacted, the Headteacher will act as required.

When your child starts at the school, forms will be shared with parents asking for medical information or any allergies. It is extremely important that you inform the school of any medical problem that could affect your child while at school, e.g. asthma, allergy, epilepsy.

Should your child require medication during a school day, please contact the school to make arrangements.

Health and Safety Procedures

The health and safety of pupils, staff and visitors is a priority for the school. The Local Education Authority's Health and Safety policy recommendations are followed. Assessments of high and medium risks have been prepared to ensure that school activities are as safe as possible. Visits or activities outside the school are carefully planned to avoid accidents and reduce risks.

In an emergency where the Headteacher is required to close the school, any decision to close the school will be made to ensure the well-being and safety of pupils. No pupil will be released unless he/she has a safe place to go. Fire drills are held on site every term to ensure that we can quickly evacuate the building in an emergency situation. Should a child need to go to hospital, a member of staff will accompany them if parents have not arrived at the site.

Sports and Physical Activities

The learners have swimming, gymnastics or dance and games lessons at the Leisure Centre in Pwllheli for ten weeks of each term.

An after-school fitness club is held during the Summer term for the children of Reception year to year 3. The pupils also take part in the school's 'Dal i Fynd' club where they run a mile every week around the school field.

Pupils from year 2 and 3 will have an opportunity to compete in the Catchment Area Schools' swimming gala every year and year 3 will join children from the catchment area in football, rugby, hockey and athletics competitions every term.

Playtime

Every pupil has a break from their lessons at 10:40am. The children play on the playground or school fields, depending on the weather. They mix with their friends, and positive play and the sharing of resources is encouraged. Children are encouraged to be physically active during playtime by playing traditional 'playtime' games and playing with various play equipment. Children from the Nursery class up to Year 2 will have an extra ten minutes session in the afternoon.

Healthy School

Ysgol Morfa Nefyn is a Healthy School! This means that we are part of Gwynedd's Healthy Schools Scheme. The school has been awarded the highest award of the scheme, namely the National quality award. The aim of the scheme is to encourage schools to be active in terms of promoting the health and well-being of pupils, teachers and the wider community by developing a health promoting environment.

This is done through the following:

- ❖ The school's National Curriculum and practical activities of the Foundation Phase
- ❖ The school's ethos and day to day activities
- ❖ Links that are already established with parents, the community and specialist agencies

Eco-school

The school is proud to be part of the eco-schools scheme. It is designed to empower and inspire young people to make positive environmental changes to their school and wider community, while building on their skills, including numeracy and literacy, and encompassing Education for Sustainable Development and Global Citizenship. Additional Learning Needs

At Ysgol Morfa Nefyn, each child is valued as an individual and their needs are dealt with sensitively and effectively. We believe that all children receive a broad, balanced and differentiated curriculum ensuring that self-esteem and confidence are enriched and that a positive attitude is developed.

Ysgol Morfa Nefyn is committed to the successful inclusion of pupils with Additional Learning Needs. In our school, every teacher is the teacher of every pupil, including those with ALN.

At school, every child is equal, valued and unique. Our aim is to provide an environment where all pupils feel safe and can thrive. We will respond to individuals in ways that take their varied life experiences and specific needs into account.

We are committed to providing an education that enables every pupil to make progress so that they achieve to the best of their ability, become confident individuals who live a full life and transition successfully into adulthood.

The school has robust procedures to identify the educational needs of each pupil at an early stage in order to respond to those needs. All children will join all the school's activities, and receive individual attention as needed. They will have individual work and have the opportunity to collaborate with other children.

We will promote close collaboration with parents and any external Agencies as required. An Individual Education Plan is designed for the children with additional learning needs and we will review them regularly. We will always be sensitive to the children's requirements and ready to praise the successes in order to raise the child's self-confidence and self-esteem.

A copy of the ALN Policy is available at the school for anyone who wishes to read it.

MAT Children

The school will promote and enhance the talents of children deemed to be able and talented in a particular area. This will be done by means of the school's normal curriculum and/or by facilitating an opportunity for these children to develop the talent. The special provision for these children will be discussed during parents' evenings.

Equality

Ysgol Morfa promotes equality in all aspects of the school's work offering full access to the Foundation Phase and the Curriculum to all children without discrimination in terms of language, gender, age, creed, ability or the child's nationality or background.

The school has a policy and a Strategic Equality Plan and every effort is made to ensure that this is implemented fairly and appropriately for everyone who attends the school.

We are aware of our responsibility to make reasonable adjustments to assist disabled shareholders, and through our Disability Equality Scheme we encourage input from the whole school community.

Children in care

Every child in the care of the local authority is entitled to access to pre-school education and all education services and to receive every opportunity and assistance to develop educationally and socially. In accordance with its statutory duty, the Gwynedd Schools Service will advise and assist schools to safeguard and promote the welfare of a looked after child and particularly promote the educational achievement of the child. The Headteacher is the person responsible for promoting the attainment of looked after children in education.

The school's performance

As a school, we are very proud of our recent Estyn report, which clearly recognises the hard work and dedication that takes place here every day. The report highlights the high standards of teaching, the care and support given to every child, and the way we work together as a school community. It reflects the commitment and passion of our staff, pupils and parents, and we are delighted that Estyn has acknowledged this.

Child Protection

Parents/carers should be aware that schools have a responsibility for ensuring the welfare of all pupils. This responsibility means that:

- ❖ the school will have child protection policies and procedures
- ❖ the school should make parents or carers aware of its child protection policy.
- ❖ there might be a need to refer their child to the statutory children's welfare agencies if they believe that their child is at risk of suffering significant harm;
- ❖ the school should attempt to work with parents/carers regarding their child's welfare and be impartial if their child is referred;
- ❖ the school should help the parents or carers to understand that if a child is referred to social services or the police, this is done in the child's best interest and report to the police in terms of their child's welfare and educational progress.
- ❖ the school will regularly provide the parents / carers with the latest information regarding the child's welfare and educational progress.

If you are worried about your own ability to cope, worried about the safety of your child or another child, please let the school know immediately.

Further arrangements to ensure pupil safety:

- We ensure that every member of staff, governors and regular visitors to the school has an up-to-date DBS check.
- All staff are aware of the policy and have completed Child Protection training.
- Every visitor to the school is supervised 100%.
- There is one main entrance in the school and every visitor, other than parents, signs in and wears a prominent badge.
- A suitable ratio exists for playtime and lunch-time supervision.
- A record is kept of concern about children.
- Children are referred to Social Services by the designated person for child protection if there are any suspicions.
- Teaching staff have been trained with the 'Using Reasonable Force' policy.

The personal information about pupils that we collect and use:

- Personal information and contacts to identify pupils (name, gender, date of birth, address, unique pupil number (UPN), e-mail address, emergency contact details)
- Characteristics (ethnicity, nationality, language of the home, free school meal eligibility)
- Lunch payments and the child's meal patterns
- Safeguarding information (court orders, personal participation and reports of social and child protection services, relevant background information about the family)
- Special education needs (needs and position including 'More able and talented' information)
- Attendance (number of sessions attended, the number of absences and reasons for the absence)
- Medical and administration (information about GP, allergies, medication and dietary requirements)
- Assessment and attainment (statutory and non-statutory test results, educational history, expected attainment levels, termly and annual reports)
- Information about behaviour (suspensions and any provisions that have been put in place)
- Timetable and classes attended (including musical instruments lessons)
- Photographs (including close circuit television CCTV images)
- Permission for school trips and published photographs (including the name of the person who issued the permission and date)
- Details of persons permitted to collect the pupil from school

We collect and use information about pupils for the following purposes:

- To support the pupil's education
- To monitor and report on the pupil's attainment
- To provide appropriate pastoral care
- To assess the quality of our services
- To keep children safe (food allergies, emergency contact details, CCTV images)
- To meet statutory requirements for the use of data collections, statutory inspections and audit purposes

Complaints

The School is committed to dealing with complaints effectively. We aim to clarify any issues you are unsure about. If possible, we will correct any mistakes we have made and we will apologise. We aim to learn from mistakes and use that experience to improve what we do.

Our definition of a complaint is 'an expression of dissatisfaction in relation to the school or a member of its staff which requires a response from the school'.

We have a complaints procedure which ensures that anyone with an interest in the school can express a concern and be confident that it will be fully considered and, if it is believed that your concerns are well founded, that the matter will be resolved. treat appropriately and without delay.

A New Curriculum has been introduced by the Welsh Government since September 2022. Here at Ysgol Morfa, we are planning a curriculum that will help your child to be:

1. an ambitious, capable learner, who is ready to learn throughout their life
2. an enterprising, creative contributor, who is ready to play a full part in life and work
3. an ethical, informed citizen, who is ready to play a part in Wales and the world,
4. a healthy, confident individual, who is ready to lead fulfilling lives as a valuable member of society

Planning

When planning at Ysgol Morfa, emphasis is placed on offering our learners rich, broad and deep learning experiences of high quality that are suitable for their age and development.

This means giving learners enough time to cultivate, practice and apply knowledge and skills in order to embed their learning. By planning cross-curricular themes, we ensure that the learners reinforce the skills across the curriculum with confidence. Our plans differ to give each individual the opportunity to learn new skills, succeed and persevere in order to challenge themselves. We develop a healthy attitude to ensure that all learners enjoy and feel proud of themselves.

We also plan to ensure that our learning experiences and teaching develop the holistic skills below that our learners need to achieve the 4 purposes. This lays solid foundations for the next stages of their learning and ensures confident, enthusiastic individuals who are ready to learn throughout their lives.

Planning to learn skills

A combination of methods is used to plan the curriculum in this school in accordance with the requirements according to the age of the learners and the context of the learning. Elements of planning for direct teaching will take place (mathematics and literacy), as well as disciplinary and multidisciplinary teaching, in order to learn and practice specific skills e.g. learn a specific maths or phonics skill.

Planning a theme to develop cross-curricular skills

Interdisciplinary and integrated elements are used in order to further practice skills and apply them in different cross-curricular contexts within a specific theme E.g. bringing together elements of Mathematics, Language, Digital Competence and Humanities within a cross-curricular theme. The voice of the child, their families and the community is important to us and because of this, there is flexibility in our planning to follow the learners' path or follow a local or global event that arises. This ensures that our learning experiences are relevant and interesting as well as raising the learners' motivation and enjoyment.

The following are very important elements that we will continually incorporate into our plans:

- Health and Wellbeing
- The voice of the child and their families
- Digital Competency Skills
- Fun and stimulating activities
- Learning outdoors

Compulsory elements of the Curriculum

Here at Ysgol Morfa Nefyn we pay regular attention to the compulsory elements of the curriculum when planning:

Relationship and Sexuality Education	We plan Relationship and Sexuality Education in order to support learners to develop the knowledge, skills and values to understand how relationships and sexuality shape their own lives and the lives of others. Learners are prepared and empowered to ask for help on matters relating to Relationship and Sexuality Education and to advocate for themselves.
Religion, Values and Ethics	Religion, Values and Ethics is a statutory part of the Humanities Curriculum and is based on a series of consensuses and big ideas. Our curriculum provides a range of disciplinary methods to support learners as they critically engage with a wide range of religious and non-religious philosophical beliefs. Religion, Values and Ethics in our school has been designed to address the agreed syllabus.
Welsh	Education is presented in the school through the medium of Welsh. Pupils are immersed in the Welsh language and its culture in the early years.
English	English is taught in year 3, when the pupils are 7 years old and have received a solid foundation in Welsh.



Assessment and progress

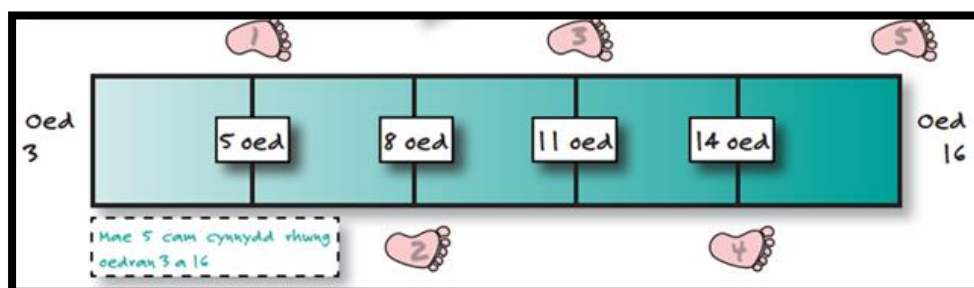
Curriculum for Wales gives us the opportunity to ensure that learners' progress is the main purpose of Assessment and not an accountability exercise. To this end, we at Ysgol Morfa Nefyn pride ourselves on developing a complete picture of each learner's development, including their well-being, willingness and desire to learn as well as the development of their skills, knowledge and understanding. We emphasize the importance of ensuring understanding of progress across the practitioners of the school and on regular discussions with parents and carers to discuss their children's progress.

The school will fulfil the Curriculum Assessment Purposes as follows:

1. Continuously support individual learners day to day
2. Identify, crystallize and reflect on the progress of individual learners over time
3. Understand the progress of groups in order to reflect on practices

Learning descriptions

We use the **Learning Descriptions** for each **Statement of What Matters** for assessment and planning for learner progress. These roughly correspond to expectations for ages 5, 8, 11, 14 and 16 and offer guidance on how learners should demonstrate progress within each Statement.



These are not used as a list of boxes to be ticked, but rather as tools to be considered when planning for the progress of our learners.

In addition to this, there are principles of progress which underpin our planning for learners' progress across the areas over time.

Ysgol Morfa Nefyn assessment methods

The progress and needs of learners and specific groups of learners are regularly discussed through professional dialogue in order to plan for further progress. Such discussions will also facilitate and promote any transfer and transition between classes and schools.

Formative use is made of national tests and internal tests as required to track progress.

Regular discussions are held with the learners and their parents/carers to discuss progress including external agencies when necessary.

The school's assessment methods are shown below:

method	What we do:
Assessment on entry	• We observe and record the achievement of each learner on their entry to the school in Nursery and Reception or from a transfer school. These initial assessments are used to track progress and development.
Continuous day-to-day assessment (Assessment for Learning)	• Use of characters to set success criteria for pieces of work. • Give feedback to pupils based on the criteria (oral and written). • Discussion about work is central to the assessment so that the children are aware of their success and their targets. Growth mindset ladder is visible in every workbook so that they can be easily referred to in a feedback discussion. • Time for the learners to respond to feedback through conversation, an opportunity to practice a mistake or practice spelling. • Time to improve and correct Work.
Support / progress tracking of pupils	• Internal assessments in reading and mathematics twice a year to identify progress. • Personal assessments in literacy and numeracy annually. • Each child's progress is tracked through a tracking system. • An individual tracking file is kept for ALN learners, making use of suitable literacy and numeracy tests. • A spelling challenge tracking learners' spelling on a weekly basis. • Minute a day – tracking and celebrating learners' success in tables on a seasonal basis.
Report to parents	• A parents' evening is held twice a year to discuss achievement and targets. Specific targets are shared with the parents. • Parents receive an annual report in term 3. • An opportunity to see the pupils' workbooks twice a year at the parents' evenings. Examples of the pupils' work are regularly shared on Seesaw and google classroom. • Open afternoons are organized for parents to see their children at work in class.
Transfer	• Pupils of the school transfer to Ysgol Nefyn. • A professional meeting is held between the staff of the two schools to share and transfer information. • There is a good link between the school and the cylch meithrin. An annual timetable gives the children the opportunity to visit the school regularly within the year.
